

at which Captain Philips with some men had been  
stationed in Woodcock Valley, had been attacked by the  
Indians & burned - Appellee and that he with seven others  
started in pursuit. They came to the house, found it  
burned as stated, and started thence on the trail of  
the Indians and after following probably half a mile  
came to a spot near Japay's mountain where they found  
ten of Philips's men killed scalped & stripped. Two  
of the men, brothers, had been tied together to a sapling  
& shot through with arrows; - another had been killed  
by having been stuck in the neck like a hog - Appellant  
once also rode from Piper's fort over Japay's Mountain after  
night to Moore's Garrison, to give information that the Indians had  
come in, and went back again the same night.

Appellant further saith that he was born in York Penn & in the  
year 1761 - & was about 11 or 12 years of age when he came to this county.  
He has a record of his age - He was called into the service by enlisting  
in the militia & volunteering - and was about sixteen years of age  
when he first went out. - He has lived in Bedford County ever  
since the Revolutionary war.

He never had a commission.

That the Rev'd Mr. McAlvary and Major John Piper  
can testify as to his character for veracity and that  
John McAlvary, John Young & Genl. M'Graw can testify as  
to his services. Had one discharge but lost it.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension  
or annuity except the present, and declares that his name  
is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state.
