Reference is made to your letter relative to George Engley, a soldier of the Revolutionary War.

The data furnished herein are obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, V. 4000, based upon the wilitary service of George Enelsy during the Revolutionary War.

He marched from Bedford County, Pannsylvania, in the latter part of 1776, as substitute for his father (his father's name not given), and served two mouths as private in Captain Jaseb Hendarehot's company in Colonel Moses Graham's Pennsylvania regiment. He served in 1777, two months under Lieutenant Jonatham Buck in the Pennsylvania troops. He served in 1778, seven months in Captain John Moore's company, was out against the Indians and in several skirmishes. After which he served as captain of Bedford County Militia until the close of the war, and was stationed at different times at Martins Fort, Pipers Fort and Wisegaws Fort.

He married, December 2, 1783, Elizabeth Martin. They were married by the Reverent John Ring. It is stated that her father and family (no names given) lived in Martine Fort during the latter part of the Revolution and that her father exact the land upon which the fort was built.

The soldier, George Engley, died in 1889 or 1821. His widow, Eligaboth, was allowed pension on her
