

Springfield Township now Huntingdon County families fled there  
and some erected houses there & lived in them, we guarded the Block-  
house & families when any alarm w<sup>t</sup>; come families do collect  
our duty was to scour the country if any trail could be found  
to give chase some individuals and families were killed and  
some taken prisoner but not very near; the alarm and fear of the  
Indians increased every year and our services became more

arduous; again in the spring of the year 1781 we continued our  
services (heretofore some had moved away or deceased not recollect) some  
individuals endeavored to raise some grain in place  
Golden Valley some eat their grain & others do not risk their  
cross & let it remain in the field, Indian killed some men under  
arms near Mechanics Hill in Morions cove & some other depres-  
sions that gave alarm & applicant had to go out a partie to

take Capt. McGee

into custody (he had taken

his company to join the Indians against his own country (Upper  
to be Kettawian Town) but on being disappointed owing to some  
misunderstanding that took place in their first interview him-  
self and men escaped narrowly and returned but our partie  
did not succeed & return, without finding him; on another  
excursion passed over a mountain in the night had only a  
path the hill very steep in descent we frequently slipped and  
fell one on the other on reaching the bank of the river the  
Raystown branch open all the appearance of light was  
observed at a spot where no house had been shortly before that  
time; & believing it to be light from a fire kindled by Indians  
we separate & crawled towards the supposed light expected to come  
to an engagement every moment, on reaching the spot nothing  
there but a small house lately erected having while boards  
for a covering on entering the house discovered that the family  
had only left it a few hours before a small hog being in the  
house Bateson's & well cleaned shortly before, Bateson was found and  
all hands to cooking having struck up a fire every one hun-  
gry forgot all danger for a short time, the light was great &  
the smell of the pork roasting their situation so dangerous one  
of Indians was near, & applicant apprised them of Alleged danger  
they were strangers to him, continued their cooking & eating sent to  
sleep on finding his warning did not avail he took his gun  
went in the dark & stood guard until day light after roasting
