

at a Court House about day light; we had crept over in
the night and also killed a number - the British were
reinforced and we retreated and recrossed at Ambry to
which place our boats had been removed - the prisoners
we had taken were then sent to Morristown in the State
of New Jersey - The British followed us to Ambry and
drove us from there to Elizabeth town and above it where
they pretended to retreat and we in turn pursued them
back through Elizabeth town where they were near surround-
ing us and we were again obliged to retreat - on this re-
-treat Captain Lock was killed - we retreated to a place
called the three lanes under where we were reinforced and
turned on the enemy and took, in and about Elizabeth
town, about twenty five or thirty prisoners which we sent
to Morristown - the next day we engaged with the enemy
again at McQuashiney hill near Newark where we killed
several - we pursued them further the next day but did not
overtake them - we then returned to our quarters at Elizabeth
town where I remained until we were discharged - I was out
of this town one month - Their Commander was General Wayne
his Colonels name he does not now recollect - his major
was Gourindylle on both these towns of service - when out
with Captain Metcalf, one of his Lieutenant was Dennis R.
Hoglan - on his 2^d tour of duty his lieutenants were John-
ston and Palmer - and after Lock was killed Johnston
had the command - he does not recollect the names of
the other officers there but saw a great many - Some years
after this he went from Hunterdon County over to Easton
in Pennsylvania where he had two cousins enlisted in
the Horse Service - at which place he enlisted under a
recruiting officer called Captain Stead expecting to get
into the horse service he was contented in the fort -
He enlisted for during the war or five years - he thinks he
did not serve five years until he was discharged - but can-
not be certain - his recollection is now very bad - And his
impression is at this time that he had served but between
two and three years until the peace was made and he was
discharged - He recollects well of being at the battle of Mon-
mouth and at the battle of Trenton where they took the
