Alexander King served in the Delaware Continental Line, and was a pensioner from Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania, for services in the War of the Revolution.

The Archivists of the Pennsyvlania State Library write me that their Records show that he served as a Sergeant, in Major Thomas Church's Company, 4th., Pennsylvania Regiment Continental Line, and on a second Record in Major Thomas Church's Company as a Sergeant, February IOth., 1777, Corporal to February IIth., 1780, and on another list he is shown under the head "Sergeants". It is shown that Alexander King served in Captain Darling's Company one year; resemblisted in Captain Fishbourne's Company, February Ist., 1777, and was discharged January 1781, and he resided in Huntingdon County in 1813; that he fought at Long Island, Trenton, and was wounded at White Plains, served as a Corporal at Brandywine, Germantown and Monmouth, and as a Sergeant in Sullivan's Expedition against the Indians, and was discharged for sickness in 1781.

Will you kindly give me what his pension application shows, and if it shows who his wife and children were, we would like to get that, as some of the descendants here in this city want to join the Society of Daughters of the American Revolution
